## 1. In Memoriam Patric Lally, R.I.P.

On Thursday, 19th July, we received the sad news that Patrick Lally, father of Miss Frances Lally, had died. On Monday, 23rd July, in the presence of twenty faithful, including the Lally family, Fr. Charles Ryan, F.S.S.P., offered up a Traditional Latin Requiem Mass for Patrick at Q.O.P. Church. The funeral Mass was offered at Our Lady of Fatima Church on Saturday, 28th July.

## 2. News from our seminarians:

### A. Mr. Kent Grealy

#### "The Journey So Far"

"I recently completed my third year of formation at Our Lady of Guadalupe Seminary, located just outside of Lincoln Nebraska, as a seminarian of the Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter. This marks the halfway point to Diaconate (2021) – and, God Willing, in four more years I shall be ordained to the Sacred Priesthood (2022). I have so far received clerical Tonsure, as well as the Minor Orders of Porter and Lector. Next year I hope to receive the Orders of Exorcist and Acolyte.

"Seminary formation focuses on every aspect of the individual, on both natural and supernatural levels, for the priest is the *Alter Christus*. I have experienced great growth spiritually, intellectually, and personally throughout these past years, which have been filled with untold and uncounted graces. God has shown me the true Joy that comes from following Him and seeking to do His Will. "I am come that they may have life, and may have it more abundantly" (Jn. 10:10). Indeed, He has, mercifully, given me that abundant life. Pursuing my vocation has been nothing if not a great adventure!

"I have finished my philosophical studies, and will be moving on to theological studies this upcoming year. Some of the courses I have taken thus far include subjects such as Metaphysics, Ethics, Philosophical History, Latin, Greek, Chant, Ecclesiastical History, as well as many other topics.

"I am a member of one of our two scholas, and am also the Head Librarian and Head Photographer at the seminary.

"Please continue to pray for me and my vocation, that I may always follow and do God's Holy Will. Be assured of my prayers.

### B. Mr. Julian Malinowski

"I've composed a short resumé of my vocation before entering seminary. I will describe my seminary experience for the next 'update'.

"I've intentionally made this first one regarding my background, so the listeners know me a bit better:

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#### **"The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few" - LK 10:2**

"I was born in 1993, raised in Calgary by a polish mother, and a father born of polish immigrants. Sunday mass was routine for me, and I frequented catholic youth groups and retreats, even into high school. Polish holiday traditions, and catholic youth slowed the nefarious influence of the world on my

soul, though having lived without any meaningful experience in prayer, I struggled to anchor in an identity.

"During my studies at university I began examining the historical setting to which I have been brought, and how that reality compared with everything I had been taught by school and society, notably with regard to Catholicism. The rather abrupt death of my father (after a short battle with brain cancer) just before my eighteenth birthday shook me away from the Church and into a pit of isolation, where I struggled violently to fill the spiritual void in my soul, and to keep the buried grief at bay.

"It was thanks to an invitation of a humble university teacher that I first attended the Extraordinary form of the Roman Rite. At the time I was studying classical saxophone at the University of Victoria, and so I accepted the invitation to sing in the Latin Mass Choir. I was instantly attracted by the beauty of Gregorian chant; the richness of the liturgy; the mysterious depth of the Latin language.

In the choir, I met some young catholic men and moved into what was called 'The Newman House' — a house for young, male catholic students. Close quarters with other catholic gentlemen, daily community prayer, and the vigilance of a chaplain promoted a rediscovery of faith. I began attending daily mass at the university chapel. I became involved in the sacristy, learned to altar serve, and integrated into the Catholic Students' Association. I found meaning in liturgical reverence, and particularly in the mystical energy of gregorian chant. My involvement in the catholic society in Victoria grew - I became the sacristan and master of ceremonies at the university chaplaincy; and the cantor and choir director at the Latin Mass. Though I had somewhat weak motivation to apply myself at university, I was strongly involved with all three rites of the Catholic church: The Ordinary Form, the Divine Worship of the Anglican ordinariate, and the Tridentine Extraordinary Form.

In the summer of 2016, I did some serious discernment with my spiritual director regarding my vocation. I got rid of my cell phone, and my roommate concurrently decided to undergo a hazardously avant-garde experiment - not renewing our internet subscription. The consequences of "unplugging" were palpable: Immediately, fear and a certain anxious boredom took me; however, having distanced myself from things outside myself, I quickly learned to pray in the interior silence by listening patiently for the loving presence of God.

I longed for a life radically different from everything I'd known. I decided to apply to seminary, and found myself shortly after at the seminary of the Institute of Christ the King in Florence, Italy. I did a year of apostolate in Livorno in 2016 prior to my entry to the seminary in September of 2017. I have just finished the first year, the "year of spirituality," and I received tonsure and the cassock at the beginning of July 2018.

I thank you sincerely for your support of my vocation, and request especially your prayers for the sanctification of priests, and the protection of budding vocations. I will keep everyone in my catholic sphere informed on my progress through seminary, particularly my benefactors.

### 3. First High Mass at Our Lady Queen of Peace – 15<sup>th</sup> July, 2018



On Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> July, we had our first High Mass in about fifty years. The celebrants were Fr. Ryan; Mr. Oballo, Deacon; & Mr. Grealy, Subdeacon. Mr. Malinowsky served as Master of Ceremonies and six other servers assisted. Seventy-two people were in attendance in all, which is our highest number ever for an ordinary Sunday Mass (*i.e.* not including Easter or Pentecost or Christmas on a Sunday).

## Liturgy

The first is the Solemn Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary on 15th August; the second, the Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary on 22nd August. The entire month of August is dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of our Lady (hence the blue border on this newsletter). Please note that each of these feastdays falls on a Wednesday. These are extra Masses which Fr. Domotor has agreed to celebrate on those days. Please attend one or both of these Masses if you can, especially the Assumption.
